#### **EUCHARIST 9**

The Mass has two main parts: (1) The Liturgy of the Word; (2) The Liturgy of the Eucharist. In the first part, through the readings and the homily, God speaks to us. What is asked of us is to 'listen'. To be reading the parish bulletin, which some are wont to do, is contrary to the spirit of the first part. 'Blessed are they who listen to God's word, and live by it day after day.'

After the Creed and the Prayers of the Faithful, we enter into the Liturgy of the Eucharist; beginning with the Preparation of the Gifts. As we sit after doing so much listening, we tend to put our brains into neutral. We might be unaware of what's happening. Before the Last Supper, Jesus sent two of his disciples to a house of a friend to 'prepare' the table. Spare a thought of appreciation to your fellow parishioners who, before we all arrive, prepare the bread and wine, the chalices and the altar, in readiness for our ritual sacrificial meal. If you are offered the privilege of bringing up the bread and wine at the offertory, gladly accept.

In the Middle Ages priests felt uncomfortable with silence during the offertory. They felt every liturgical action should be accompanied with prayers. Therefore, as the priest holds up the bread and wine, he borrows from the Jewish ritual, and says a prayer of blessing over the gifts, doing something similar to what Jesus did at the Last Supper. Today, if the people are singing, the priest is supposed to say these prayers quietly. If there is no singing, the prayers are said audibly.

These prayers set the bread and wine apart from ordinary use and designate them for a sacred purpose. They also remind us that the gifts we offer result both from the action of God and of human beings. God provides the sun, rain, grain and grapes. Human beings make the grain into bread and grapes into wine. In response to the priest's prayers, the assembly gives praise and thanks to God in these words: 'Blessed be God forever.'

Before the priest prays over the wine, he pours a few drops of water into it. The prayer that accompanies this action intimates the significance of the ritual. It expresses two great truths: (1) Christ, who is divine, became human. (2) He did this so that we, who are human, may share in his divinity. Through the mystery of this water and wine, may we come to share in the divinity of Christ, who humbled himself to share in our humanity. If we allow these truths to resonate in our minds during the preparation of the gifts, our hearts will overflow with sentiments of gratitude and praise. These are the sentiments that should dominate our entire Eucharistic celebration.

Before praying the Eucharistic Prayer, the priest washes his hands. This is a gesture and a sign of his desire to seek inward purification. As we watch the celebrant performing this cleansing ritual, we can also silently pray that

'God will wash away our iniquity and cleanse us from our sins.' It is desirable that we come with humble and contrite hearts before the all holy God. We express these sentiments here, at the Penitential Rite, and just before we receive Holy Communion: 'Lord, I am not worthy...'
