Newsletter - Passion Sunday - 31 March/1 April 2012

Today Jesus returns to Jerusalem for the final and decisive time. He has foreseen the coming crisis and spoken of it many times. As we saw a few weeks ago, the first action of Jesus in his public life was to 'turn the tables' of the money changers in the Temple and drive out those who sold the animals for sacrifice. In the coming week he will completely supplant the whole traditional Jewish cultural practice without in any way altering its intent.

His entry upon this critical week, this week of prophecy, of witness to the reality of the relationship which God seeks with people of every time and place, began yesterday at the home of his friends, Martha, Mary and Lazarus. Just as he had been baptized by a member of his family, signifying and ushering in his life's work as prophet, in the tradition of Moses the liberator and giver of the Law, so on the day before he enters Jerusalem for the final time he is anointed High Priest and 'King of the Jews', not by the religious establishment but by a woman, by his dear friend, Mary.

Since his first public appearance in the Temple, Jesus had come on other occasions 'in secret', because his time had not yet come, but the time for secrecy has passed. As John tells us (11:55-57) there was a lot of interest, even nervous anticipation, among both the ordinary people and the leaders as to whether Jesus would come to the feast this year or not, and if he did come what the consequences might be.

Though it was not apparent on this day when Jesus entered the Holy City riding on a beast of burden, this coming week would see the overthrow of the established religious way of life and establishment of a radically new one.

'On the night he was betrayed', that is to say, at the beginning of the day on which he was to die, Jesus put an end to the Temple as the unique and central place of worship and of encounter with God and replaced it with the gathering of friends around a dining table; he put an end to animal sacrifice as a sacrament of the laying down of one life so that others might live by himself becoming the perfect and complete sacrificial victim (= 'source of life'), laying down his own life, once and for all, and by insisting that the kind of sacrifice that God seeks is not cultic and symbolic but direct and personal, the relationship in love of sisters and brothers gathered around a dining table, with all the demands for selflessness that that entails; he put an end to institutional priesthood by himself becoming the one and only High Priest who would always be intensely and personally present as host whenever any, anywhere, gathered around his table in his name.

The tables are being turned; a radical new order in which Jesus alone is Lord, victorious over fear and alienation, over sin and death. is dawning.

This one feast, the greatest and most ancient of all our feasts, is a three day feast like three chapters in a book as we follow the last days on earth of Jesus, as he celebrates the Passover, washing the feet and giving us a sacramental memorial of his death and resurrection in the Eucharist as we recall his suffering and venerate the Cross on Friday and as we await his rising from death on Saturday evening. The liturgy is designed as a continuous celebration beginning on Thursday and ending on Saturday with this final blessing.

CARITAS PROJECT COMPASSION REFLECTION: Your Project
