


PARISH HISTORY BOOK LAUNCH: the

Thirty-Second Sunday of Ordinary Time

Jesus has finally come to Jerusalem after the long journey we have been on for the past months, in which each reading of the Gospel on Sunday began with a few words about Jesus moving on to another place, always closer to Jerusalem, and to the fulfilment of his mission. Today he has 'sat down', within the city but outside the Temple – time to draw the story together. He points to the contrast between the influential and self-important leaders who want to be seen as good and important and the poor widow who unobtrusively acts out her faithfulness and integrity.

Last week a lawyer questioned Jesus about which is the greatest commandment, and Jesus demonstrated to him that he already knew the answer. The question was- was he prepared to live by it? As Father Zosima says in Dostoyevski's 'The Brothers Karamazov', 'Love in action is a hard and awesome thing compared to love in dreams.' In the Judeo-Christian tradition, love is a matter of choice, of commitment, of continuing decisions to persevere in, and to grow a relationship. It is not, as is often represented in society, a matter of attraction and feelings. Love based on 'felt' attraction is unsustainable. So when we pray the great prayer of Deuteronomy, 'Listen Israel, you shall love the Lord your God with your whole heart and with your whole soul and with all your strength', we are saying that we will choose to put what God wants in the first place, before what we want. It is an action of our will.

This understanding of love as an ongoing decision to make our choices in a certain way, God first then those with whom we have committed relationships, and then to all, is demonstrated clearly by the famous saying of the early Egyptian monk, Abba Alois, 'Unless a person says at one point, 'God and I alone exist in this world', they will never know peace.' The same is clearly true of marriage, of community and of all genuine friendship. Love is a matter of constantly choosing.

The story which we have heard today about Elijah and the widow, about the jar of meal and the jug of oil, draws our attention to the matter of faith. In our tradition, faith is a way of looking at our world, it is a 'world view' from God's point of view. It is not simply a matter of acknowledging certain statements intellectually, but is fundamentally a matter of trust. We always enter into this position of trust from a position of weakness. If we are in control, we don't need to trust. We can make things happen 'on demand'. And we are always tempted to get ourselves into a position of control for precisely this reason. But actions arising from such a position of power are rarely just or inclusive. This is true of marriage, of community, of friendship. We can love the other person or persons, but we must trust, from a position in which we do not have control, that love is mutual.

Like the widow at the treasury, the widow who Elijah met on the road was not in control, but she put her trust in the Man of God. The response of this unnamed powerless woman has stood for three thousand years as the archetypal image of the genuine child of God – the person of faith. And her trust was not in vain: "The woman went and did as Elijah told her and they ate the food, she, himself and her son. The jar of meal was not spent, the jug of oil was not emptied, just as the Lord had foretold through Elijah.'....RH
