31st Sunday in Ordinary Time Suffering

Believers in God face a twofold problem: the existence of evil and suffering. If God is good, where does evil come from; and how come good people suffer? Simple answers abound. On the extreme left, God is portrayed as not involved at all in evil because God is not much involved in good either. On the extreme right, God is directly implicated in evil deliberately – almost callously – inflicting pain and suffering upon us in order to teach us a lesson or to test us. In the middle, we have the traditional explanation that God does not cause evil: God only permits it.

The suffering of the innocent is a hard nut to crack: natural disasters, the terminal illness of a young child, the sudden death of a loved one, a brutal murder, an act of terrorism, Auschwitz...these are used as arguments against the existence of God. The story in the book of Job focuses on the question: 'Why do innocent people suffer?' Job is a good man. He struggles with the loss of his family, his wealth and his health. In his sadness and despair he cries out for answers. The author of the Book of Job was a literary genius. He must have been the ancient equivalent of a William Shakespeare. He is a top notch dramatic poet. Job and his dubious comforters wrestle with the problem of suffering. Job protests his innocence; but his friends try to load him with guilt: for surely suffering is punishment for sin. By the end of the book the problem of suffering remains unresolved and we are none the wiser. But we need not be despondent, because none of the greatest minds in human history – whether Christian or not – have devised a definitive answer.

People react to suffering in various ways. Some rebel and revolt, shaking an angry fist - if not at the real God -then at some false idea of God. Some turn stoic trying to bear up, tight-lipped, avoiding the question: 'Why?' They passively accept what can't be understood or changed. But some align themselves with Job, placing their complete trust in God, even in the face of the incomprehensible. They begin by asking 'why' and then live in the mystery. But as Christians we turn to Jesus who broke the nexus between suffering and sin in the story of the blind man in chapter nine of the gospel of John. 'Neither this man nor his parents have sinned.'

Jesus, the suffering Son of Man, is the icon of suffering innocence. Jesus also gave us the 'good news' that God wishes to deliver us from all evil. From Jesus we learn that suffering can be redemptive for us individually, as it was for humankind in the passion and death of Christ. But even Jesus did not explain suffering. He endured it, an 'innocent Lamb' in the sight of God. (1 Peter 1:19) Christ teaches us that suffering can acquire a meaning: We can learn from it. We can be ennobled by it. We can grow through it. We can be genuine disciples by taking up our cross and following the Master. We can – in the teaching of St Paul - be co-redeemers with Christ by joining our suffering to his. The bottom line is: our faith and trust in God must be as steadfast as Job's. Our faith and trust are built on the rock of Christ who chose to accept the way of the cross as the royal road to the salvation of humankind.

Sickness and tragedy are part of the human condition. Sickness does not discriminate between good people and bad. Sickness and tragedy are not sent by God to punish us or to test us. If good people were exempt from suffering, then why did Jesus suffer, why did the good man Job suffer? We often ask the question: 'Why me?' Maybe we should ask the question: 'Why not me?' In our parish there are many good people suffering or seeing their loved ones suffer. Our parish cares for them and they are remembered in every Mass I offer. May God give them the courage they need in carrying the cross laid on their shoulder, and may God send them people to comfort and care for them in this their hour of trial.
