THE MISSION OF JESUS

While we celebrated the Feast of the Baptism of Jesus last Sunday, our three readings today give us a very specific slant to the baptism and mission of Jesus.

St John's Gospel is the only one of the four gospels that does not record the account of Jesus' baptism in the Jordan River. No doubt, as John was writing seventy years after the Baptism and it was well known to his readers John did not need to give an account. So today, John's Gospel (1:29-34) is a theological reflection on who Jesus is—the Lamb of God.

THE LAMB OF GOD

We Australians who have grown up on roast lamb and have seen sheep farms with thousands of sheep , may fail to appreciate the word 'lamb' as applied to Jesus. Jewish law dictated a lamb from a small flock of a shepherd had to be killed at least once a year at Passover to demonstrate how serious the Jews then were about atoning for their sins. Such a sacrifice was very costly to the shepherd who only had a dozen or so sheep. This was tithing big time (giving one tenth of our assets).

St John is teaching us that as the Lamb of God, Jesus is God's most precious gift; God's own self. God can give us nothing more than Jesus. His sacrifice replaces all the religiously slaughtered lambs in Temple worship.

Secondly, John's original readers would have known that the word in their Aramaic language for sheep is the same word used for servant. So Jesus is servant, fulfilling the prophecy of Isaiah (49:3-6)

Today in our first reading we hear Jesus is the Lord's servant, the light of the nations. (cf. Richard Leonard SJ)

At every Mass we pray, "Lamb of God you take away the sins of the world, have mercy on us" and "we are called to the supper of the Lamb", the Eucharistic Body and Blood of Christ

OUR OVERSEAS PRIESTS FROM IRELAND: Father Kevin Condon CM of Dublin has researched the early priests of Australia. He found that 406 Irish priests were ordained from All Hallows College, Dublin to serve in the foreign missions in Australia and New Zealand between 1840 and 1896. The All Hallows College supplied the majority of Melbourne priests. When in 1887 Archbishop Thomas Carr came to Melbourne as our second Archbishop, there were 40 of the 51 Melbourne diocesan priests from All Hallows

One of these forty, Fr Thomas Donaghy introduced the Society of St Vincent de Paul to Melbourne and was a jail chaplain assisting Ned Kelly at his execution in 1880. Of particular interest to us at Sunbury is the priest who organized the naming of our school and church as Our Lady of Mount Carmel in 1860 was Fr James Moore from All Hallows as was our recent parish priest (1997-2005), Fr Martin Ashe now our Regional Episcopal Vicar in the absence of a regional bishop since 2012.

WITHIN OUR REACH: JOY

Friedrich Nietzsche (1844-1900) infamously taunted Christians about the lack of joy on their faces and in their lives. "They would have to sing better songs for me to believe in their Saviour: his disciples would have to look more redeemed!"

Nietzsche the German atheist Philosopher, had a point. Christians can often appear joyless, not joyful. We can literally become 'killjoys', murdering the spirit of light heartedness that signifies closeness to God.

There can be a constant 'moralism' in some of our Catholic rhetoric that does nothing but bemoan the evils all around us. It is counter-productive and we end up talking to ourselves. By contrast, Jesus *attracted* people to him with joy – he did not preach 'at' his fellow Galileans. If we are without joy, we exude displeasure and are prone to pick fights. Others perceive a hostile streak in us. We can insult people. We lack patience. What flows from our mouths are not blessings but barbs of bitterness.

We lack gratitude. We also lack human warmth and seem to be angry at ourselves and the world. The profile of such joylessness is clear and distasteful: bitter, impatient, pugnacious, hostile, cold and aloof – all 'killjoy' qualities. By contrast, as Pope Francis constantly reminds us, Christian joy is buoyant and warm, light-hearted, gracious and life-giving.

PROFILE OF OUR PARISH: the Catholic population grew 9.8% in the years 2006 to 2011 to 13232 persons, 35% of the total population. The number of Catholic households is 5855, where 755 Catholics live alone. The total population of our area increased by 8.6% to 36238.

The number of parishioners requiring assistance in self-care, communication and mobility was 565; those Catholics providing unpaid help were 1252.

Those unemployed were 4%, though those aged 15-24 who are in the labour force and unemployed at the time of 2011 were 8.6% (10.2% Australian average).

Those parishioners born in Australia are 83%; other countries: 2.4% Italy, 2% UK, 1.6% Malta, 1.2% Philippines, 1.1% India, 1% Ireland (21 other countries under 1%)

12% of our families are one-parent families (Australian average); 56% of couples have mixed religions, 15% are de facto. 83% of families own or are purchasing their homes.
