Seeking the merciful face of JesusLenten Program Resource 2016

THE TRANSFIGURED JESUS ENCOURAGES US TO JOURNEY ON.

Prior to the event of the Transfiguration, Jesus had outlined to his followers the demands of discipleship– they will have to carry their cross.

To encourage and refresh his followers, Jesus led three of them, Peter, John & James to a mountain to pray. There his face changed and his clothes became brilliant as lightning (Luke 9:28). There God reveals "This is my Son, the Chosen One. Listen to him." It is God who brings the disciples to the mountain and reveals the glory of Christ– his body is transfigured. It is always God who calls and invites us into being a disciple. The gospel continues with Jesus saying to Peter they cannot stay on the mountain, but he and his disciples need to come down from the mountain and journey onto Jerusalem. We need the consolation of prayer, but we need to continue our earthly journey for as St Paul tells us today "For us, our homeland is in heaven". (Philippians 3:20).

ENCOURAGED BY THE SISTERS OF ST JOSEPH OVER 100 YEARS

The Church teaches that those who consecrate their lives as religious men and women are to be evangelical witnesses to others. By living out the radical demands of obedience, chastity and poverty, they reveal how to live Christian life.

Today, we give thanks to God and celebrate the great witness of the 89 Sisters of St Joseph who have lived and served among us since 1916. This was only fifty years after St Mary MacKillop and a couple of sisters opened their first school in a stable in Penola, S A

As Jesus led his disciples up the mountain to pray, Mary MacKillop wrote in 1973, :God gave me such a sense of his watchful presence." From an early age Mary had a deep sense of God working in her life. She made time to be with Christ in the chapel. Like the disciples who came down the mountain, Mary did not spend all her time in contemplation but was practical: "Never see a need without doing something about it." (1867). She had seen the plight of uneducated children in rural Australia. From her well-educated father Mary knew the benefit of education. She would send her sisters out of the cities, into the country. Following that tradition, Sister Lambert O'Donnell, Sister Francis de Sales and Sister Joseph Fagan came to our parish in 1916 in a small country town of Sunbury.

LIVING OUT THE CHARISM OF ST MARY OF THE CROSS

In 1900, Mary MacKillop urged her sisters "Seek first the poorest, most neglected parts of God's vinevard."

Mary's early life was turbulent. She wrote in 1873: "My life as a child was one of sorrows, my home when I had it, a most unhappy one." Her father was unable to find work and he made risky financial decisions leading to poverty. Mary's parents separated. Hence, Mary was very compassionate to those in need.

The Sisters in Sunbury lived a very simple life, with the parishioners at times supplying them food and other essentials. Only after sixty years in Sunbury did the Sisters get their first car. Fr Jim Feenan now aged 89 years, who is unable to be with us today, taught the Sisters to drive. Fr Jim was our parish priest from 1973 to 1977.

OUR GRATITUDE

The Irish-born Father John Gallivan began serving the Sunbury Catholics in 1887 when Sunbury was part of the Gisborne Mission. After 24 years, he was appointed the first parish priest of the new Parish of Sunbury in 1911. The Sunbury Parish invited the Sisters to come through Fr John Galivan who personally paid for the land for a new convent in Macedon Street.

The Sisters took over the leadership of OLMC School (the first school in Sunbury) which had educated children since 1860. In 1916, there were 106 students. This afternoon, an Honour Board with the names of the 89 sisters who have been with us over the 100 years will be unveiled at the convent. We give thanks to God for the gift of the Sisters of St Joseph and thank them for their kindness and generosity over these hundred years, journeying with us in times of joy and of sorrow.



Lent 2016

The Lenten season has a twofold character:

- It recalls baptism or prepares for it
- It stresses a penitential spirit

By these means especially, Lent readies the faithful for celebrating the paschal mystery after a period of closer attention to the Word of God, and more ardent prayer. In the liturgy itself and in the liturgy centred instructions, these baptismal and penitential themes should be more pronounced.

Hence,

- Wider use is to be made of baptismal features proper to the Lenten liturgy
- The same approach holds for the penitential elements

During Lent, penance should not be only internal and individual but also external and social...

In any event, let the paschal fast be kept sacred. It should be observed everywhere on Good Friday and, where possible prolonged throughout Holy Saturday, so that the joys of the Sunday of the resurrection may be visited on uplifted and responsive spirits.

.....Constitution on the Sacred Liturgy, Vatican II

Ash Wednesday and Good Friday are days of Fasting and Abstinence from meat

On all other Fridays, except solemnities, the law of the common practice of penance is fulfilled by performing on of the following:

- Prayer
- Self-Denial
- Helping Others

All who have completed their eighteenth year and have not yet begun their sixtieth year are bound to fast. All who have completed their fourteenth year are bound to abstain from meat(Canon 1252)

Each of the faithful is obliged to received Holy Communion at least once per year. This precept must be fulfilled between Ash Wednesday and Trinity Sunday 22 May 2016 unless for a good reason it is fulfilled at another time.

The Sacrament of Reconciliation is a gift from our merciful Father. All the faithful are bound to confess any grave sins at least once per year.

PROJECT COMPASSION: this year Caritas celebrates 50 years of the national Project Compassion campaign. Over the past 50 years Project Compassion has enabled Caritas to work in partnership with local communities in 118 countries. Your support has enabled Caritas Australia to assist marginalized communities throughout Africa, Asia, Latin America and the Pacific as well as Australia's First Peoples.

During this Lenten season, the Church invites us to be more loving and generous with our time, our talents and our material possessions. Let God's abundant love motivate us to reach out to love others, family and friends, neighbours and those who need our compassionate love.

Prayer: For our brothers and sisters around the world experiencing extreme poverty and injustice. That people with disabilities will always be supported with the love and respect that is theirs by virtue of our shared humanity.

LENT FOCUS: YEAR OF MERCY:

One of the corporal works of mercy is give drink to the thirsty: Mother Teresa wrote a letter to the Missionaries of Charity in Easter 1993, "Jesus wants me to tell you again how much is the love he has for each one of you– beyond all what you can imagine. Not only that he loves you; even more-he longs for you. He misses you when you don't come close. He thirsts for you. He loves you always, even when you don't feel worthy. Why does Jesus say "I thirst"? What does it mean? Something so hard to explain in words. "I thirst" is something much deeper than just Jesus saying "I love you." Until you know deep inside that Jesus thirsts for you, you cant' begin to know who he wants to be for you. Or who h wants you to be for him."From Archbishop's Office for Evangelisation reflections written by Br Mark O'Connor FMS and originally published in Kairos Vol 22.

One of the Spiritual Works of mercy is to instruct the ignorant. Actions speak louder than words with this work of mercy. We are privileged to be Catholics and hear the precious message from Jesus our Saviour. We are asked to instruct the ignorant by sharing the Good News with those around us who do not share this privilege. Be careful not to bark orders at those who are being 'instructed' as this is not what Jesus would have wanted us to do. Remember Jesus lived the message and shared it with others. A great example of how to instruct the ignorant is from Pope John XXIII. He has been quoted as saying "Anywhere I go in the world, if someone in need passes by my house at night, he will find a lighted lamp in the window. Knock. I will not ask if you are a Catholic. Two brotherly arms will embrace you and the warm heart of a friend will make a feast for you." No wonder, this holy man opened the 'windows' of the Church at Vatican II and let 'fresh air' in.
