PARISH WISDOM

The Parish Assembly on Saturday 3 September threw up some words of wisdom, some gems from those who attended. Asked to introduce themselves and express in one word what parish meant for them or what they hoped to contribute to the parish, here is a list of some of the words that come to mind: welcoming, support, belonging, engagement, encouragement, renaissance, fellowship and friendship, gratitude, love....

<u>Welcoming</u>: A number of participants mentioned 'welcoming'. They saw their contribution to the parish as being welcoming to friend and stranger. Every person – big or small, rich or poor - that comes to our church should experience a warm welcome. Every visitor to our parish should be made to feel welcome. They should take away the impression that ours is a welcoming parish.

<u>Support & Care</u>: A few mentioned 'support'. Some saw themselves as being called by God to support those in need. They lend support by offering transport to those unable to drive; by visiting the shut-ins; by taking communion to the sick and the elderly. Another word for 'support' is 'caring', caring for others. Support cuts both ways. Through the support provided by carers all in our parish should feel cared for and supported.

Belonging: We can all pray to God in our private homes. But the Catholic religion is more than 'just me and my God'. The parish gives us a sense of 'belonging'. We belong to the people of God. We belong to the universal Church. We belong to the Catholic Archdiocese of Melbourne. But it's in our local parish Church, where we feel most at home.

Engagement: What do we understand by the word 'engagement? Most of us want to be useful. We want to be 'engaged', involved. We feel we have a contribution to make. We want our gifts to be recognised. We do not want to bury our gifts. We would like to use our gifts for the benefit of our parish community.

Encouragement & Growth: To 'encourage' someone is to help that person to grow. We encourage others when we give them affirmation, show them appreciation, and give them positive feed-back. We have the opposite effect on people when we belittle them, put them down, and are negative towards them. To encourage is to promote growth in a person.

<u>Fellowship & Friendship</u>: Some have made friends through coming together at parish events and through working together in parish groups and in parish projects. The parish provides many people with a social outlet. It is good to see people talking together after Mass rather than rushing off without engaging with fellow worshippers.

Gratitude: The humble person appreciates the gifts of others and the service they provide. The grateful person does not take others for granted. The Eucharist essentially means *'thanksgiving'*. Our Sunday Mass gives us an opportunity to thank God for his many gifts and blessings. Our gifts of nature, friends, family - even our health – are not taken for granted. We have much to be thankful for.

Renaissance: Someone mentioned *'renaissance'* which means rebirth, renewal, and a whole host of other things. At our parish assembly, seeing what's happening in our parish and the plans for the future, gives one a sense that our parish is alive. There is a sense of rebirth, new life. Ours is not a perfect parish. We can always do things better, but there are signs that we are moving in the right direction.

Love & Mercy: Finally, someone mentioned 'love'. In a sense, all the above are manifestations of 'love'. To serve others and the parish community with love is the hallmark of a Christian. To give of our time and resources to the poor and needy through the corporal works of mercy is to show our love. The above is just a sample of the wisdom and spirit that flowed through the parish assembly. At a later date a fuller report will be forthcoming.

Below is the winning entry called the "Crying Dove" by Lucia Roohizadegan from McKinnon Secondary College. The following is the message Lucia conveyed with this powerful piece.

"...delivers the message of asylum seekers through symbolism. The dove conveys the idea of hope, freedom and spiritual enlightenment as opposed to the bars with the innocent children trapped behind them. A beautiful golden wattle in the beak of the dove is a symbol of inspiration drawing the conclusion that the freedom and safety will be found 'down under'. Colours are complimentary to the way the picture makes us feel from sadness and melancholy towards more positive emotions."

CHILD PROTECTION SUNDAY: 11 SEPTEMBER: The images of child sexual abuse have continued to affect our entire community and diminish the trust some have placed in our Church. That trust has been further eroded when the institution has failed to appropriately respond to the victim's needs. Yet the Catholic Church is in unique position to offer much within this focus of creating stronger communities, safer Children. One such example can be seen in Pope Francis' Apostolic exhortation Amoris Laetitia, in which families and consequently communities are encouraged through love, strengthened by the virtues of generosity, commitment, fidelity and patience to become stronger more capable and more resilient. Stronger families and Church communities can then help to keep our children safe.

As the Royal Commission begins to finalise hearings and close registration for private sessions, Child Protection Week, and in particular Child Protection Sunday provides a wonderful opportunity to reflect on the steps we have taken to make children safer in our communities; at home, in our churches, schools and Catholic agencies

Here at Sunbury Parish we can see evidence of the strength of our community providing support, protection and opportunities to help keep our children safe through regular audits of the Working With Children Checks for all volunteers who work with or near children and vulnerable adults in our parish.

LEGION OF MARY: wish to thank the parishioners and school children who attended Mass on Thursday 8 September for the Feast of Our Lady's Birthday. We thank Fr Brian McMahon who came from afar to celebrate Mass for our community. We also congratulate Stephanie Rozario who pledged herself to the works of our Mother Mary and became a member of Legion of Mary.

SILVER JUBILEE OF ORDINATION: on 31 August Father Gerard Keith celebrated 25 years of ordained priesthood. Fr Gerard was an assistant priest among us from 1995 to 1998. He is currently parish priest of three parishes in Geelong: Bell Park, Geelong West and Manifold which have four churches.

CONGRATULATIONS ON YOUR CENTURY: to Don Barker who turns 100 next Tuesday. Don is a recent arrival among us and is a regular worshiper at 10.30am Mass coming with his daughter Joan.

NUNS REFUSE TO ABANDON CITY: Religious sisters, including a French Carmelite sister said in August: "It is the poorest of people who are still in Aleppo Syria... We have no water, no electricity, and the fighting is continuing incessantly. How can we abandon these people in their suffering?" Aleppo has 250000 residents, including 40000 Christians.

25000 AT BISHOP'S FUNERAL: Bishop Edward Daly of Derry died on 8 August. As a priest in 1972, the civil rights advocate went to the aid of those injured on Bloody Sunday 1972 when British troops killed 13 protesters in the street. The photograph of him waving a blood-stained white handkerchief as he escorted a group carrying a dying man to safety went global. "He was a gentle shepherd with a sensitive heart and a generous disposition; ever caring to the sick, the bereaved and to victims of all sides of the Troubles." said Archbishop Eamon Martin of Dublin.

CATHOLICS' NEW VIEW OF LUTHER: The German Catholic Bishops have published a 206 page report conceding Rome had made mistakes in its handling of the leader of the Reformation, Martin Luther (1483-1546). They write the Reformation has not reached its original target of reforming the Church but has led to division and this is a tragedy.

The Bishops say while Luther's work still posed some challenges, Luther shall now be seen as "a religious pathfinder, Gospel witness and teacher of the faith."

Pope Francis is to attend a Catholic-Lutheran prayer service at the Protestant Cathedral of Lund, Sweden on 31 October marking the year-long commemoration of the Reformation.

134 CHURCH WORKERS AT 50TH CONVENTION: last week, church workers in marriage tribunals including men and women, 40 priests and 8 bishops gathered from Australia and New Zealand to learn more of the new streamlined procedures for people seeking an annulment of their failed marriage. The number of people enquiring has trebled at the Melbourne Office (9639 4211) since the Pope issued the new procedures on the Feast of the Birth of Mary our Mother on 8 September 2015. Fr Frank Morrisey OMI of Canada, a member of the Papal Commission addressed us.

FR ANDREW CAMILLERI: aged 69 years entered eternal life on Thursday at his presbytery in Thomastown West after a few days of serious illness. Born in Malta he was ordained a priest in Valletta in 1981 and came to Melbourne where he has served in various parishes since 1991. We offer our prayerful sympathy to the parishioners of Thomastown West who are shocked at their loss of their priest who served them for eleven years. Fr Andrew was the life of the party among the Maltese priests in Melbourne. His large physical stature was matched by his generosity, kindness and welcome.

RESPONDING TO FRIENDS AND FAMILY WITH SAME SEX ATTRACTION: in todays current climate, knowing how to respond to those experiencing same-sex attraction can be confusing. As Catholics we are called to respond in a way both loving and truthful. A public forum at Cardinal Knox Centre will explore how to respond. The movie "Desire of Everlasting Hills" will be screened, followed by a panel discussion with personal testimonies from people who have experienced same-sex attraction and found peace in Christ's teaching on love and sexuality. The panel will include an international guest Fr Philip Bochanski from Courage International a Catholic ministry to people with same-sex attraction.
