THE PRAYER OF HUMILITY

The parable of the two men in the temple gives us another lesson on prayer: pride gets in the way of true prayer; whereas the prayer of the humble person goes straight to the heart of God. The parable is directed at those who pride themselves on their virtue, and who despise lesser mortals. The boastful words of the proud are but a form of self-worship, whereas the prayer of the humble person pierces the clouds.

The Pharisees believed that the Law covered every facet of life. In their view, perfection consisted in the meticulous observance of every minute detail of the law. Their fault did not lie in their zeal for the law but in the pride they drew from it. The Pharisee was like Little Jack Horner who sat in a corner eating his pudding and pie. He patted himself on the back and said, 'What a good boy am !!' This self adulation in the prayer of the Pharisee robbed it of its efficacy.

In his mind, the Pharisee did not need God to get him to heaven. He would get there on his own merits. He will pull himself up by his sandal straps. He also erred by comparing himself with others. As we all know, 'comparisons are odious' but they also can be a foolish path to follow. It should be easy to find someone not as clever, not as pious, not as intelligent and not as good as we are: this will lead to pride and self-satisfaction. But if we are to compare ourselves, let us compare ourselves with the all-holy, all-just and all-perfect God: this will give us a true picture of our standing, and lead us to humility. Humility is truth. It is the truth about ourselves.

We notice another thing about the prayer of the Pharisee: his prayer was self-centered. We are told that 'the Pharisee stood there and said this prayer 'to himself.' The prayer is littered with 'I do this' and 'I do that.' While the prayer of the Pharisee seems to address God, it only wants God to be a witness to a tiresome litany of self congratulations.

By way of contrast, the humble prayer of the humble tax collector went straight to the heart of a compassionate and merciful God. 'God, be merciful to me a sinner.' The simplicity of the tax collector's prayer is disarmingly uncomplicated. The tax collector, acutely aware that he is in the presence of the all-holy God, humbly acknowledges his unworthiness. His prayer is the prayer of naked truth. It tugs at the merciful heart of God and showers down mercy upon him. The man can't justify himself, so it is left to the merciful God to give him justification. 'This man, I tell you, went home again at rights with God: the other did not.'

It is most appropriate to begin Mass with the humble prayer of the **Penitential Rite**. We acknowledge our unworthiness in the presence of the all-holy God, and we say, 'Lord, have mercy; Christ, have mercy; Lord, have mercy.' Catholics, who come to Church on Sunday, should not compare themselves with others.

REFLECTION: this story illustrates today's Gospel beautifully. It also shows how some 'flaws' are blessings to others too.

A Water Bearer had two large pots, each hung on the ends of a pole, which he carried across his back. One of the pots had a crack in it, while the other pot was perfect and always delivered a full portion of water. At the end of the long walk from the stream to the house, the cracked pot arrived only half full.

After two years of what it perceived to be bitter failure, the cracked pot spoke to the Bearer one day by the stream. "I am ashamed of myself, because this crack in my side allows my water to leak out all the way back to your house."

The Bearer said to the pot, "Did you not notice that there are flowers on your side of the path, but not on the other pot's side? That's because I have always known about your flaw, so I planted flower seeds on your side of the path, and every day while we walk back you water them. For two years I have been able to pick these flowers to decorate the table. Without you being just the way you are, we would not have such beauty."


