#### **PARACHUTE PACKERS**

Some time ago a friend of mine sent me this story. Charles Plumb was a US Navy pilot in Vietnam. After seventy-five combat missions his plane was shot down. Plumb ejected and parachuted into enemy hands. He was captured and spent six years in a communist prison. Surviving the ordeal, he now lectures on lessons he learned from that experience.

One day when Plumb and his wife were sitting in a restaurant, a man at another table came up and said, 'You're Charles Plumb. You flew jet fighters in Vietnam from the aircraft carrier Kitty Hawk. You were shot down.' 'How in the world did you know that?' asked Plumb. 'I packed your parachute,' the man replied. Plumb gasped in surprise and gratitude. The man pumped his hand and said, 'I guess it worked.' Plumb assured him, 'It sure did. If my chute hadn't worked I wouldn't be here today. Thank You!'

Plumb couldn't sleep that night. He tried to picture the man clad in Navy uniform, white hat, a bib in the back and bell-bottom trousers. He wondered how many times he had passed the man without so much as a "good day" or "how are you?" After all, Plumb was a pilot and the man was just a sailor, a backroom man. Plumb thought of the many hours that man had spent at a wooden table in the bowels of the ship carefully weaving the shrouds and folding the silks of each chute, holding in his hands the fate of some pilot.

This story makes me think of the many people who pack the parachutes for our parish:

the secretaries and the parish team who do so much work in the background,

the ladies who clean the churches,

the people who open up the church and who prepare everything for Mass,

the ladies who wash the altar linen,

the men who do parish maintenance,

the lectors, the collectors, the catechists, altar servers and the special ministers of Communion,

the musicians who lead us in song,

the people who take communion to the sick,

the welcomers, the RCIA Team, the SVDP volunteers, and the Legion of Mary, Parish Education Board,

the counters of the collection and the finance team, and the people who do so much behind the scenes.

Yes, I believe I am speaking about our back stage people, our parachute-packers. As we farewell 2016, we must thank these people for their selfless contribution to the life of our parish. And as we begin this New Year, we extend an invitation to anyone who feels called to join the ranks of our brigade of parachute packers.

**EXPLORING THE WORD:** The Scriptural presentations of Mary, the mother of Jesus differ guite markedly across the four Gospels. She, along with Jesus' extended family is portrayed quite negatively in Mark (Mark 3:21, 31) as thinking that Jesus has gone mad! In Matthew's story of the birth of Jesus, the leading role is given to Joseph rather than to Mary; however, both Luke and John assign a place of honour and importance to the mother of Christ. In Luke, Mary is hailed as 'blessed among women' and is present at prayer with the twelve in the upper room after the death of Jesus on the cross, and so is also one who received the Holy spirit at Pentecost, just as she did at Jesus' conception. Unfailingly in Luke's Gospel, Mary is presented as a devout and pious Jew, who follows the Law, but more importantly, cooperates fully with God's plan of salvation. What is perhaps most touching in Luke's presentation of Mary is the truly maternal image of a woman wondering about the future of this child she has just borne and pondering in her heart the things that are said about him. .....Summit No 2016

**SHARING THE TRADITION:** one of the great devotions to Mary as the Mother of God and Queen of Peace is the daily recitation of the Rosary. The word 'Rosary" comes from the Latin *Rosarius*,



which means a garland or bouquet of roses. The history of the development of the Rosary is clouded by time but is popularly attributed to St Dominic in the thirteenth century. The Rosary combines both vocal and meditative prayer; while reciting prayers aloud, the supplicant meditates on particular events grouped in what are known as 'The Mysteries'. There are four sets of Mysteries: The Joyful, The Sorrowful, the Glorious and added most recently by the late Pope Saint John Paul II, the Luminous Mysteries.

As we honour and treasure Mary, Mother of God, let us also remember and honour our own mothers or significant women in our lives. What strengths or gifts do you recognize in them? What influence did that person have on your development and growth? ....Summit Nov 2016
