STRANGE BED FELLOWS

Jesus by his preaching and his miracles was attracting vast crowds and growing in popularity. At the same time he was also making enemies mainly among the religious leaders and the ruling class. History tells of many odd marriages of convenience between groups of opposite ideologies. The Pharisees and the Herodians were two such opposite ideologies who had nothing in common except their hatred of Jesus and their desire to do away with him. They made strange bed fellows. Together they plot to entrap Jesus on the divisive issue of paying taxes to Rome.

Together, while the crowd looks on and listens, they ask this question: 'Is it, or is it not, lawful to pay tribute to Rome?' Lawyers like to play the Yes-and-No game. You are damned if you say 'Yes' and you are damned if you say 'No'. In asking this question they aim to put Jesus between a rock and a hard place, in a no-win situation. If Jesus said that it was lawful to pay the tax, he would stand discredited in the eyes of many of the people. On the other hand, if he said that it was unlawful to pay the tax, the Herodians would be quick to report him to Rome and bring a case of sedition against him.

The tax in question is the poll tax. This tax had to be paid by every male person between the ages of fourteen and sixty-five. It amounted to one denarius, the equivalent of a day's wage for a labourer. Not only did the people hate paying the tax – a tax is never popular - they hated it even more for religious reasons. To a Jew God was the only king. Their nation was a *theocracy*. To the Jewish mind to pay taxes to an earthly king was seen as an insult to God. The Pharisees, who were supremely religious, opposed the tax most vehemently, seeing it as an infringement of the divine right of God. King Herod was a puppet of Rome; and the Herodians, the party loyal to Herod, supported the tax. The Herodians owed their power, their prestige, and their livelihood to Rome. They worked hand in glove with the Roman occupiers. But, for the moment, the Pharisees and the Herodians put aside their differences. Motivated by a common hatred of Jesus, they forgot their differences and set out to entrap Jesus desiring to do away with him.

But Jesus was two steps ahead of his adversaries. Jesus meets the loaded question of his enemies with one of his own: 'Whose head and whose title does the coin bear?' He asked to see a denarius which was stamped with the Emperor's head. In ancient times coinage was the sign of sovereignty. As soon as a king came to power he issued his own coinage. The coin they fished out of their pocket had on one side the head of the Emperor and on the reverse side it bore the title: "Tiberius Caesar, son of the divine Augustus, High Priest". Jesus by-passes the politically loaded issue and goes to the heart of the matter: "Give back to Caesar what belongs to Caesar, and to God what belongs to God.' Religion and politics are a volatile mixture. But in matters of State and Church God has supremacy.
