JESUS IN MARK'S GOSPEL

Some people find it hard to love God because some of the images they have of God are horrible, making God unattractive and unlovable, someone to be afraid of. Enter Jesus, God incarnate, God-in-human-flesh. In Jesus we meet a God who lived with us and is on our side. One of the Christmas prefaces says this of Jesus: "In him we see our God made visible, and so are caught up in the love of the God we cannot see." St Paul calls Jesus, "The image of the invisible God." Jesus is the perfect image of God.

The object of our Christian faith is the person of Jesus of Nazareth who lived briefly on earth less than 2,000 years ago. All four gospels are faith documents proclaiming Jesus as the Christ, the Son of God, our Saviour. Jesus is an historical figure, but the 'historical Jesus' and the 'Gospel Jesus' are worlds apart. The gospels only provide us with the Jesus of our faith. Since this is the Year of Mark, my question is: "What does Mark have to say about Jesus?"

By reading Mark's gospel reflectively we will find what the early church believed about Jesus. It greatly helps our approach to Mark's gospel if we know that Mark was not trying to write a biography of Jesus as we understand it today. Mark wrote a faith document. He put together stories of Jesus in a new creative form which he called "gospel". Gospel comes from the old English word, 'god-spel', 'good news'. The core of the good news is found in the resurrection of Jesus after people had crucified him. Reading Mark's gospel I often think, 'Where is the good news?' So much of the story shows Jesus being misundedrstood, rejected, hated, wrongly accused, in constant conflict with the leaders of established religion, and fiinally crucified. Jesus in Mark is the suffering Christ, who ends up on a cross. The good news comes at the end in the resurrection story. Mark wrote his gospel to stir his readers to a more committed life as Christians and to encourage them in their persecution and suffering.

In chapter eight Jesus asks the question: "Who do people say I am?" The crowd is way off the mark. So Jesus asks his disciples this more crucial question: "But you, who do you say I am?" Peter jumps in and acknowledges Jesus as the Christ. But what sort of Christ? Not the sort Peter had in mind. The Christ of Mark's gospel is a suffering Christ.

For me, the person of Jesus in Mark's gospel stands out more vividly than it does in any other gospel. The person of Jesus is not obscured by blocks of teaching as found in Matthew's gospel, nor is it obscured by long soliloquys as found in John's gospel. The teaching found in Mark's gospel is fed to us in small doses at the end of each episode in which Jesus is the main actor. My prayer this year is this: "O Lord, for this I pray: to see thee more clearly, to love thee more dearly, and to follow thee more nearly, day by day." If you ask me, 'What difference does it make to go to church?' I'll answer you this way. What hope is there for a non church-goer to know and love Jesus? I'm afraid very little. Without at least a weekly dosage of contact with Jesus in the gospel it is almost impossible to know Jesus, let alone to love him dearly and to follow him faithfully.

ASH WEDNESDAY MASSES: Lent begins on Wednesday 14 March with 3 Parish Masses— 9.30am at St Anne's Church including some school children; 12.30pm at Our Lady of Mount Carmel Church including some school children; 7.00pm St Anne's Church.

The biblical custom for repentance was to fast, wear sackcloth, sit in dust and ashes and put them onto one's head. In the early Church, Ash Wednesday marked the onset of a period of sober reflection, self-examination and spiritual redirection. At first only public penitents— those who were guilty of serious misdemeanors-received the ashes. They were made to appear barefooted at the Church and perform penances for their sins. Friends and family began to accompany them, perhaps in sympathy and in the knowledge that no person is free from sin; so gradually, the ashes were given to the whole congregation. The ashes are made by burning the left over palms from last years Palm Sunday to give a sense of connectedness with those who have gone before us and shared the Christian tradition.

Pope Leo in the 6th Century gave this insight into the observation of Lent: "What a Christian should be doing at all times, be done now with greater care and devotion."

Prayer for Season of Lent: Lord, help us to focus on You and not allow material success and good living obscure the need for you to be the centre of our lives. Help us to recognize your presence in every human being, no matter how difficult to us they might be, for you love them as you love me. Amen.

LENT– ASH WEDNESDAY 14 FEBRUARY: Ash Wednesday is a day for fast (one full meal and two small meals) for those over 18 and under 60. It is also a day of abstinence from meat for those over 14 years. In Australia, Catholics are obliged to receive Holy Communion once between Ash Wednesday and Trinity Sunday, 27 May.

DAYS OF REPARATION AND FASTING: the Australian Bishops have asked for days of prayer and fasting in reparation and sorrow for child sexual abuse and for the healing of victims. The report of the Royal Commission has made us painfully aware of those among us who committed abuse and others who through action or inaction, enabled abuse.

The days of reparation are an opportunity to seek forgiveness and pray for the healing of our parishes. The days commence on Ash Wednesday to Saturday 17 February. Cards for personal prayer are available after Mass.
