HE DESCENDED INTO HELL

The following article appeared in the parish bulletin some months ago. At the request of a parishioner, who is still troubled by that phrase in the creed which says "he descended into hell", it is repeated.

Possibly the most intriguing part in the Aposles' Creed (our profession of faith) is the phrase, 'he descended into hell'. What are we to make of it? How are we meant to understand that peculiar phrase? Surely, Jesus did not visit the hell where Satan, his dark angels and the damned are to be found! What then does the Catechism of the Catholic Church teach about those strange words in the Creed?

The word 'hell' is derived from the German 'hel' (realm of the dead). The frequent New Testament affirmations that Jesus was 'raised from the dead' presuppose that the crucified one sojourned in the realm of the dead prior to his resurrection. This was the first meaning given to the apostolic preaching to Christ's descent into hell: that Jesus, like all men, experienced death, and in his soul joined the others in the realm of the dead. Between his dying on the cross and his rising on the third day Christ entered into the realm of the dead. He descended there as Saviour, proclaiming the Good News of salvation to the spirits imprisoned there.

Scripture calls the abode of the dead, to which the dead Christ descended, 'hell' – Sheol in Hebrew, Hades in Greek – because those who are there are deprived of the vision of God. Such is the case for all the righteous dead while they await their redeemer. Jesus did not descend into hell to deliver the damned, nor to destroy the hell of damnation. He went to free the just who had gone to their death before him. The Gospel was preached even to the dead. Christ's descent into 'hell' brings the Gospel message of salvation to complete fulfilment. This is the last phase of Jesus' messianic mission, a phase condensed in time, but far-reaching in its application. The saving death and resurrection of Jesus is spread to encompass all who dwelt on earth, those who went before him and those who came after him. Christ went down into the depths of death so that 'the dead will hear the voice of the Son of God, and those who hear will live' (Jn 5:25).

IN BRIEF

By the expression "He descended into hell" the Apostolic Creed confesses that Jesus did really die and through his death for us conquered death and the devil, "who has the power of death" (Heb 2:14). In his human soul united to his divine person, the dead Christ went down to the realm of the dead. He opened heaven's gates for the just who had gone before him. Jesus' 'descent into hell' as found in the Apostles' Creed is the 'underworld' rather than the place of damnation. By dying Jesus entered the company of the just souls of those who had died before him, and therefore shared with them the fruits of his saving mission. In that brief period of time between his dying on the cross on that Friday afternoon and his rising on Sunday morning, Jesus reached out to those in the shadow of death and extended to them the grace of eternal salvation.

FIRST VISIT IN 59 YEARS: on 5 February, President Erdogan of Turkey visited Pope Francis in Rome, the first such visit by a Turkish leader in 59 years. The meeting centred on the 'situation in the Middle East, with particular reference to the status of Jerusalem, highlighting the need to promote peace and stability in the region through dialogue and negotiation, with respect for human rights and international law" (Vatican Statement) Turkey occupies a strategic role as a bridge between Asia and Europe.

BEJING PRAISES "WISDOM' OF POPE FRANCIS: A popular, state run newspaper says the Vatican and Beijing will re-establish diplomatic ties "sooner than later and that any problems related to a deal will be solved by the 'wisdom' of Pope Francis. This would be a major breakthrough in the 70– year attempt by the Vatican to normalize diplomatic relations with Beijing.

Since 1793 the Holy See's diplomatic service has relations today with 183 countries. A crucial role is paid by the Pope's Foreign Minister Archbishop Paul Gallagher who was the Papal Nuncio in Canberra a few years ago.

LENTEN PERSONAL REFLECTION FOR THE WEEK AHEAD:

What do we look for on a mountaintop? A family returned from a holiday and were retelling the story of a climb they had undertaken. It took a morning and was steeper and harder than any of them had thought it would be. One of the teenagers, looking up from her phone, observed that 'they could do more with that place you know, like they could have a coffee cart or a food truck or something up there.' We all look for different things on our mountain tops!

In the biblical tradition, important things happen on mountains: our ancestors saw the mountain top as a place where people were closer to God and the transcendent. This week, Jesus leads Peter, James and John to the top of a 'high' mountain and then something astonishing happens. They see Jesus in a new light—perhaps in a way that would not have been possible if they had not been alone with him in an isolated place. They suddenly realize what a close relationship Jesus had with their ancestors, and they were fearful. Their powerful experience concludes with them hearing God anoint Jesus as his son and with the request to 'listen to him'. As 21st century readers of the Gospel we know that the drama of the story is building and that Jesus is set now for certain suffering. But how can we listen to what this means for hearts and souls?

Perhaps there is something we can learn this week about being attentive. An insight about the 'science of attention' might help: "The science of attention teaches us that we tend to pay attention to what we have been taught to value and that we tend to be astonishingly blind to change until something disrupts our pattern and makes us see what has been invisible before. The same science also teaches us that we don't have to depend on surprise, crisis or trauma to help us see better. Rather, we can seek out the best partners, tools and methods to help us see. We can internalize the message of the basic brain science of attention." (Now you can see it: how the brain science of attention will transform the way we live, work and learn p 243)

Perhaps this is a week for being attentive.

Reflections this week:

- How is your prayer life? Do you mainly pray only when you want something?
- What are my blind spots?
- To what should I be paying more attention?

Prayer: Lord, during this holy retreat time of Lent, encourage us in our efforts to be more prayerful and to be more attentive to the whisperings of your spirit in our lives. Amen

WHERE THERE IS PAIN THERE IS LOVE: and where there is love, there is God. Jesus proved that on the Cross. Love, too, can transport us to unchartered places." quote Sr Hilda Scott OSB (cf 'Surrender" Diocese of Wollongong Lenten Resource)

Where people have experienced major pain in their lives— whether through illness, separation, grief, depression for example— their life becomes different—transformed if you will. Life will never again be the same because they have been through so much and are now stronger, wiser perhaps. "Because of pain, one can know for sure that there are depths to life and unchartered waters of hope and insight that we have never seen or known." writes Sr Hilda Scott.

Love in our lives has the same affect. The English poet and playwright, Robert Browning, wrote about two people who had fallen in love. She looked at him– he looked at her, as only a lover can, "and suddenly life awoke." Love changes our lives in similar ways as pain does.

"Love and its good friend, pain, will open the door of mystery and ultimately show us God." (Surrender, pg 22)

Any woman who has endured pregnancy and labour will endorse that love and pain go directly together. As Jesus endured the pain and suffering of the Cross, was the greatness of his love for us.
