PEACE-MAKING KING ON A DONKEY

History repeats itself. Our first reading from the Prophet Zechariah was written in 520BC when the northern tribe of Ephraim and the southern tribe of Judah had endured a repeated cycle of war and peace.

Zechariah writes that a new King will come, humble, riding a donkey, not in a chariot or on a warhorse. He will not return violence with violence.

Matthew writing his account of Jesus' entry into Jerusalem on Palm Sunday uses the image of Christ on a donkey, the bringer of world peace. How fortunate we are to have our parish donkey which is well cared for by our parishioners on their farm.

MY YOKE IS EASY: While we tend to think of a yoke as part of the harness to keep two oxen together, in the Jewish tradition, a yoke had a different meaning. The yoke of a rabbi was his particular interpretation of Torah (The Law) his particular teaching. The yoke of any rabbi was best identified by his answer to "Which is the greatest commandment?" When Jesus was asked that question, he replied: "Love God and love your neighbour."

The Pharisees had developed the Torah into 613 commandments— a heavy burden on people. In contrast Jesus' yoke was easy to understand and simple.

SHOULDER MY YOKE: Jesus invites us in today's gospel to shoulder his yoke and learn from him for he is gentle and humble in heart by loving God and our neighbour. This may seem simple but in fact, it can be challenging. To love God is to consciously make a place in our lives for God. Our busy lives often do not allow us room for prayer and quiet nor allow room for compassionate responses to others.

MY BURDEN IS LIGHT: To return to the farming use of the yoke, the harness was used to distribute the weight of the load and helped to keep the two animals in step. Jesus' yoke will distribute the heavy burdens between each one of us and Jesus, keeping us in step with the One who is the Way as we plough through life. Jesus accompanies us giving us the gift of right judgment to make the best possible choice to alleviate our pain and difficulties.

HUMBLE PEACEMAKERS: The Prophet Zechariah wrote of the "humble King riding on a donkey will banish chariots and horses; the bow of war will be banished. He will proclaim peace for the nations." God taught the kings were to be protectors of the poor and the defenders of justice.

2500 years later, when we observe freedom of speech and freedom of elections being trampled on, we need to support those who ask uncomfortable questions about the reasons for the burdening of the poor.

As Archbishop Helder Camara of Brazil (1909-1999) said: "When I fed the poor, they called me a saint. When I asked why the poor were hungry they called me a communist."

CHRISTMAS 2020: Last Tuesday evening, the Sunbury Inter Church Council (LEC) met on Zoom to discuss our Christmas program for the year. As social distancing will probably still be needed in December, the group decided to produce an online Christmas Carols Service, replacing Carols on the Green for this year. The Inter Church Council will meet on 25 August to further discuss the planning.



While there were many options discussed, the developing Covid-19 situation and its widespread effects and concerns throughout our communities, made our decision on the theme clear. Together in Spirit. Whether we are able to come together physically in Churches, or via a digital platform, we feel enriched by the fact that, as Australians, we will be "Together in the Spirit" on 5 July 2020. the Gospel of the day calls for those of us that are weary, to share our burdens with God. Communities around Australia, both First Nations and non-Indigenous, have endured bushfires, droughts and now a pandemic, it is only natural that our spirit also becomes weary.

There are already many burdens that exist in our communities. With the new challenges presented in times like these, it is important that we continue to place our trust in God, and try even harder to embody the spiritual gifts of empathy, friendship and love for one another.

The Covid-19 pandemic has forced NATSIC to rethink the ways in how we empower Catholics to celebrate our special day. Dear fellow parishioners,

We are all aware of the limitations which the outbreak of Corona Virus has had on our parish life. In view of this, the Finance and Development Committee (FDC) has been working hard to keep abreast of the many implications on OLMC Parish and we thought you might be interested in knowing more about our activities:

A. STAFF.

Our principal concern has been the health and welfare of our staff and we have put in place some measures to support and protect them, including

- 1. The parish office in now closed on Mondays and Thursdays
- 2. We have implemented a 'no contact' policy between our staff and parishioners/the public
- A thorough risk management audit has been conducted to ensure the normal requirements of the State and Federal Governments, such as social distancing are observed and this audit is now re viewed fortnightly
- 4. Where possible, our staff are working from home
- 5. The myriad of day-to-day issues are considered as they arise and practical steps are implemented where required.

B. FINANCE.

We identified early that the parish was going to be significantly impacted financially by this pandemic. Notably, our income has been reduced by the fact that, until recently, Masses have not been conducted disrupting our normal thanksgiving program and also that bingo, which is a substantial revenue contributor for the parish, ceased in early March.

- 1. We have applied for and received the Government's JobKeeper Wage Subsidy payments, which have offset staff costs and received the ATO's \$10,000 grant to boost 'business'. We continue to monitor this area to ensure we make use of any government subsidies to which we might be entitled
- 2. In the absence of Masses, a program was run to encourage parishioners to donate their normal thanksgiving amount electronically and we are pleased this has been taken up by many
- 3. A careful analysis has been made of our expenditure and, where possible, costs have been avoided or at least, deferred until a later date
- 4. Of particular concern was the amount which would normally be directed to the Presbytery (first) Collection and this has had to be supplemented by the Parish (second) Collection.
- 5. Initially, our financial position was monitored on a daily basis, now weekly, and adjustments are made as required. The FDC meets monthly and a sub-committee of that group meets every other fortnight

In this section, I must thank our parishioners who continue to donate to the parish, by whatever means. Your ongoing financial support has assisted the parish greatly in minimising the deficit in our finances and I pass on Father Kevin's deep gratitude for your commitment.

C. PARISH CONNECTION.

Of course, we are all disappointed that our liturgical celebrations have been interrupted to such an extent. However, our parish has remained connected to some extent through other means.

- 1. A weekly Mass has been streamed and we hope this will continue post-pandemic. It is an excellent means to enable parishioners, who are not able to attend in person, to participate in the liturgy
- 2. As restrictions are eased and more people can attend Mass (currently only 20), our Liturgy Committee is ensuring the necessary precautions are in place. While this is inconvenient, it is a critical step in our community's recovery from this virus
- 3. Father Kevin has made two video presentations to stay connected with parishioners and these remain available on our website
- 4. Our Pastoral Team supported by a great complement of volunteers has made personal contact with many parishioners who might be elderly or ill to check on their wellbeing
- 5. Early in the pandemic, the parish engaged the 'Zoom' technology which enables parish groups to meet 'virtually'. If you are in a group which would like to use this medium, please contact the parish office
- 6. Despite the difficulties, all our staff have continued to work on their usual activities so that the disruption to parish life is minimised and recovery will be smooth and as quick as possible.

If you would further information or would like to attend Mass, for which you must book ahead, please contact the Parish office (9744 1060). And until our parish community is back to normal, whatever that looks like, please stay safe and well.
