THE FEAST OF ST MARY OF THE CROSS MACKILLOP 1842->1909->

Visiting her tomb in North Sydney in July 2008, Pope Benedict XVI said, "Mary MacKillop's perseverance in the face of adversity, her plea for justice on behalf of those unfairly treated and her practical example of holiness have become a source of inspiration for all Australians."

Mary MacKillop was born in Fitzroy in 1842, the first child of Scottish migrants. She was baptised in February 1842 in St Francis' Church, Lonsdale St, then the only Catholic Church in Melbourne. Her father lacked sound financial judgement and became very poor and unemployed. "My life as a child was one of sorrow, my home, when I had it, a most unhappy one." (1873)

As the eldest of eight children, Mary went to work at 15 years old, working in retail in Melbourne and later governess and teacher in Portland and Penola. Until she was 25, she was the main provider for her family.

Seeing the need for rural children to have education she began with Fr Julian Tenison Woods a group of religious women to teach and care for the vulnerable. In four years 100 sisters began teaching in 34 schools in South Australia. In 1871, on untrue advice, the Bishop of Adelaide excommunicated Sr Mary for 5 months. In 1874, Mary sailed to Rome where her religious congregation of sisters was approved. She returned with 15 young recruits from Ireland. Mary lost significant family members: her grandfather Donald, drowned in the Darebin Creek in 1847; her young brother, Alick in 1847; her brother, John in 1867, falling off a horse and her mother, Flora drowned at sea off Eden, NSW, in 1886. Mary wrote in 1874, "When I could not see my way God kept my heart full of trust." She often heard her mother Flora say in difficult times, "God will provide." On the centenary of Mary's entry into eternal life in 2009, Sr Monica Cavanah RSJ the present Australian leader of the Sisters of St Joseph, wrote five challenges that Mary MacKillop's life calls for in each of us:

1. "Seek first the poorest most neglected parts of God's vineyard" (Mary MacKillop 1900)

The opening prayer of the liturgy for her feast states that Mary pioneered new ways of living the Gospel which respect the dignity of all in this land. There is an ever urgent call to live the Gospel by welcoming the stranger, by breaking down racial prejudice, and by hearing the cries of the disadvantaged, marginalised and isolated in Australian society and across our world. Mary MacKillop confronted the trends that diminished the people of her time and she would urge us today to do the same.

2. "Never see a need without doing something about it" (Original Rule 1867)

Mary MacKillop cared for two Aboriginal boys at Penrith at the request of her brother Donald, a Jesuit priest working among the Aboriginal community at Daly River. Mary had hoped to send her Sisters to live there but this did not eventuate. Today Mary would undoubtedly be urging us to work alongside our Aboriginal and Torres Strait Islander brothers and sisters in honouring their rich heritage, culture and spirituality and in bringing about true and lasting reconciliation.

3. "May the spirit of unity and love reign among us." (Mary MacKillop 1884)

Mary MacKillop was a woman of the Church. She took the heart of the

Church into the midst of the people, being for them "a sign and instrument"


of God's love. Today she would be calling us to be a community of disciples

where unity in diversity is respected, and where different vocations and gifts

give voice to the Reign of God in a way that is both complementary and

mutually enriching.

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4. "Let no obstacle deter us from proceeding with courage." (Mary MacKillop 1893)

In these times of crisis and uncertainty Mary MacKillop offers a sign of hope. She understands the joys and sorrows of family life, the courage required when facing illness and loss in one's life, the pain and suffering of being rejected, the strength required to speak out against injustice. She would urge us to go forward with trust in God, as she did to her Sisters in 1899" God is good and has brought light and help when all was very dark."

5. "Believe in the whispersings of God to your own heart: "(Mary MacKillop 1868)

Above all Mary MacKillop invites all in the Church to listen attentively to the murmur of God in their own heart and in the hearts of the people. This requires that we take time to listen to the small quiet voice of God alive in so many ways and in so many places, amidst the ordinariness of everyday life. God is glorified wherever and whenever the sacred is recognised.

In conclusion, as a parish, we have been blessed to have the Sisters of St Joseph among us since Sr Francis, Sr Lambert and Sr Joseph came in 1916. In total 87 Sisters have served us, generally two or three residing in the Convent which Fr Gallivan PP donated.





We also give thanks to Sr Jose` who currently looks after our parishioners so well. She has been with us since 2011 and serves our parishioners with joy and care for which we are very thankful.
