AS WE FORGIVE THOSE WHO TRESPASS AGAINST US

If God has been so generous in forgiving us, surely we should be generous in forgiving others. The process of becoming a forgiving person takes time. For some, it may take a lifetime. Only little by little are our pettiness and indignation reduced and our desire to strike back diminished.

Our unwillingness to forgive can eat away at us, and we can carry hurts from childhood far into adult years. Forgiving others, as difficult as that may be, is in the long run much easier than bearing the weight of resentfulness, vindictiveness and unresolved frustration. When we forgive we truly begin to be healed.

THE CHIEF RABBI ON FORGIVENESS: Jonathan Sacks, Chief Rabbi of Britain and the Commonwealth, writes of the pain of generations of exile, persecution, and pogroms, culminating with the Holocaust, that is written into the Jewish soul and so into their identity. It cannot be forgotten, and so he struggles:

"How can I let go of that pain, when it is written into my very soul. And yet I must. For the sake of my children and theirs (the enemy's), not yet born. I cannot build their future on the hatred of the past, nor can I teach them to love God more by loving people less. Asking God to forgive me, I hear, in the very process of making that request, His demand of me that I love others. I forgive because I have a duty to my children as well as my ancestors.... I honour the past not by repeating it but by learning from it— by refusing to add pain to pain, grief to grief. That is why we must answer hatred with love, violence with peace, resentment with generosity of spirit and conflict with reconciliation." (Dignity of Difference (2003) P190)

FAITH- A FORCE FOR SOCIAL COHESION: In late July, the renowned British Academy published a report based on substantial research that faith is a positive force for social cohesion, rather than something that leads to social and ethnic ghettos. The report, part of a wider study into how societies can sustain cohesiveness in the face of rapid political, social, economic and technological change. Faith-based social action merges from prayer; eg care for the homeless and new migrants. Prayer also builds hope Professor Tariq Modood a member of the report group said: "We need to rethink secularist assumptions and the role of religion in public life. We need better appreciate faith communities as social and national assets."

CHILD PROTECTION SUNDAY: This weekend, the Catholic Church in Australia marks Child Protection Sunday, on which we pray for those who have been abused, their families and supporters. We recognise and apologise for the harm done by priests, religious and lay people in Church settings. The Church takes a zero-tolerance approach to child abuse. We recommit to practices that support survivors and make the Catholic Church and its ministries the safest possible place for children and people at risk.

Our Parish of Sunbury has an active Child Safety Committee of six parishioners including parents, a teacher, youth workers and our priest. We meet fortnightly to study the latest standards of child safety.

PUTTING CHILDREN FIRST: CHILD PROTECTION WEEK

2020: This year marks the 30th anniversary of Child Protection Week (6-12 September). The theme for 2020, 'Putting Children First', was chosen by the National Association for Prevention of Child Abuse and Neglect (NAPCAN) and underscores the need to prioritise the safety and wellbeing of children in all aspects of our community and family life.

The occasion is of great significance for the Catholic Church in Australia as it emphasises the need for a continuous commitment to effectively safeguard children, young people, and vulnerable adults.

Partnered with the commitment to safeguard those most at risk, the Church also acknowledges the devastating harm caused by the sexual abuse of children by priests, religious and lay people within Catholic settings.

'Although the Pandemic has changed the way we are all living and working, it doesn't change what is most important,' said Archbishop Peter A Comensoli.

For Christians, the Lord Jesus shows us that at all times, the most vulnerable among us are those requiring our greatest care. Our priority is to ensure the safety and the protection of children at all times.

I am sad and angered that the Church has not always been a place that has put children first. We continue to address the horror of abuse, and I will continue to meet with survivors of abuse, hearing and trusting them, and helping our Church be continually converted.'

To grow up well, children need to feel safe and loved, have a chance to play and explore, have a say in decisions that affect them, and access to essential things like food, shelter and healthcare. For children to thrive we need to come together as a community and put children's needs first during National Child Protection Week and every week.
