A UNIQUE STYLE OF LEADERSHIP

These Sundays as we read Mark's gospel there are three predictions by Jesus that he will suffer once he arrives in Jerusalem. Last Sunday, Peter objected to Jesus suffering.

Today, Jesus confronts his disciples as they journey to Jerusalem asking them: "what are you arguing about?" They do not answer as they are embarrassed because they had been arguing who is the greatest, who will be the most important person when the new kingdom is established in Jerusalem. They expected the new king would restore justice and peace, like the great kings of their history.

WHO IS THE GREATEST?

Our Royal Children's Hospital is given the most in appeals for donations, because we value children greatly. In Jesus' time, children were at the bottom of the social scale . These were non-entities, no-bodies until adulthood, totally under the control of the father of the household.

Jesus called the Twelve to him and said: "Whoever wants to be first must be last of all and servant of all". Then he took a little child and put it among them; and taking it in his arms, he said to them: "Whoever welcomes one such child in my name welcomes me, and whoever welcomes me welcomes not me but the one who sent me". (Mark 9:37)

An example of this style of service was given by Pope Paul VI when he was elected in June 1963. He did away the crowning ceremony when the three-tiered papal crown (tiara in Latin) was put on a new pope's head. Paul VI said he wanted to be known by the title: 'Servant of the Servants of God'.

While some in our world seek position, status and power, Jesus advocates leadership should be based on being of service to others.

FAILING DISCIPLES

In chapters 8-10 of Mark's Gospel, the disciples consistently fail to understand Jesus. Let us remember the gospel was written decades after the Resurrection and the disciples like Peter and James, had died for their faith, so it is strange that these great figures are presented so poorly in Mark's gospel.

Scholars believe this is a deliberate technique of Mark to teach his community and Christians of all time that disciples do not have to be perfect, that failure does not stop one being a disciple. Jesus remains faithful even to failing disciples.

REIMAGING OUR LOCAL CHURCH AS MISSION COMMU-

NITIES: This initiative from the Archdiocese of Melbourne has 3 aims: To reinforce effectiveness in Sharing the Gospel. To facilitate Vibrant, Vital and Viable Faith Communities. To ensure equitable sharing of Resources across the Archdiocese. Three Parish representatives attended the zoom workshop of North Western Parishes on 25 August. As well as discussing the aims of the initiative the presentations gave a snapshot of the demographics of our Parish and those of our neighbours. Delegates were given an insight into how "notional" Mission Communities might be structured. Our Parish has been suggested as a participant in a "Notional" Mission with our Gisborne neighbours. This is not an announcement of a change but a potential model to be discerned, discussed and prayed about in coming months. The Archdiocese hopes to have 2 or 3 Missions moving towards implementation in the next 12 to 24 months. At this time we see the initiative overwhelmed by the Covid Pandemic and whilst we will continue to attend workshops and discussions we see our over riding concern being serving the Pastoral needs of our Parish, working to open our churches, keep them safe and welcome our Parishioners back. Should you have any concerns please speak with a member of the Parish Team.

PASTORAL COORDINATING TEAM

The PCT have identified 7 themes to support and build our parish community:

- Outreach and inclusion of the marginalised.
- Social activities.
- Engage with the young, the families and the school community.

- Communicate regularly.
