WITH HIS SIGHT RETURNED, HE FOLLOWED JESUS

In our times, Fred Hollows and other eye specialists have worked hard to restore people's eye sight. In Bible times, blindness and any other type of disability not only meant financial hardship, but also social segregation. Disability was considered a curse sent by God as a punishment of sin.

In our gospel event today, the blind man Bartimaeus is sitting by the side of the road from Galilee to Jericho, outside the town gates. He would sit with his cloak spread out in front of him to collect coins from pilgrims journeying to Jerusalem.

MIRACLE OF SIGHT RESTORED

Hearing Jesus is passing by, Bartimaeus calls on Jesus to help him and the crowd tries to shut him up and remind him of his status. But Jesus calls Bartimaeus to him and placing the needs of the other first, asks "What do you want me to do for you?" When Bartimaeus says: "Master, let me see again" Jesus announces that it is his faith that has saved him and his sight is restored.

SPIRITUAL CONTEXT—BLINDNESS

Blindness is a powerful metaphor used repeatedly in the Bible generally for blindness of heart, of mind, rather than a metaphor for physical affliction. There are multiple accounts of the healing of blindness. Saul/Paul blinded on the road to Damascus has his sight restored at his baptism. The Pharisees are described as 'blind fools'.

MODEL OF DISCIPLESHIP

In his poverty, Bartimaeus calls out to Jesus knowing that only Jesus can give him what he really desires. He jumps to his feet; flinging off his cloak and going to Jesus. Physically he has nothing now - not even his cloak. When he is healed he leaves behind all he has and becomes a follower of Jesus on the way that will lead to the cross.

RESPONDING TO OUR VISION

With our sight and the insight that can come from what we see, we have the responsibility of doing something about what we behold. We are in the position of making choices about what we look at. We are not let off the hook because some problems are so immense. We can make small steps. Here in Sunbury, the Christians have been alerted to the problem of homelessness. Now there will be some meeting to discern how we can help.

THE HOMELESS IN SUNBURY

Last Tuesday, the leaders of the seven Christian Churches of Sunbury met to discuss the welfare of the homeless in our area. It is proposed that there be a meeting of the Committee of the Winter Night Shelter and the Church leaders to discuss the future directions to assist the homeless.

HOLY TRINITY SCHOOL

On Friday, students in Years 3 to 6, moved into their new classrooms for the first time. The classrooms are equipped with new technology. The new buildings blend in well with the existing buildings opened in 2019.

He intends to attend the COP26 summit of world leaders. John Kerry the United State's climate envoy described the Pope as "one of the great voices of reason and compelling moral authority on the subject of the climate crisis".

Pope Francis has made protection of the planet a hallmark of his pontificate and he timed his encyclical on the environment "caring for our common Home" to influence the Paris COP21 summit in 2015.

THE VACCINES THAT SAVED LIVES

Smallpox existed for 3000 years. In 1980, WHO declared the disease eradicated after a vaccine program began in 1967. Polio vaccine began in the 1950's. Australia was declared polio free in 2000. Measles vaccine began in the 1970's. In 2014 Australia was declared free of measles due to the success of the vaccination program.
