THE DEMANDS OF BEING A DISCIPLE OF JESUS

This Sunday after celebrating the cycle of Lent, Easter and the special feasts of the Holy Trinity and the Body of Christ, we resume reading the gospel of Luke. Today's reading marks a turning point in Luke's gospel. It is the commencement of Jesus' journey to Jerusalem as he resolutely 'sets his face' towards Jerusalem. This begins the second half of the gospel describing that from this point forward there is no turning back for Jesus; this is the beginning of the end.

REJECTION ON THE WAY

Jews and Samaritans were of a different ethnic mix and were religious adversaries—a volatile mix. Hence, the Samaritans refused Jesus entry to their villages. The apostles James and John said, "Lord, do you want us to call down fire from heaven to burn them up?". To which Jesus rebuked the two men. Violence is not his way to deal with inhospitality. What he would bring to Jerusalem is peace (19:41-44) Jesus himself will meet inhospitality in Jerusalem and be rejected and put to death.

THE DECISIONS OF JESUS

In Galilee, Jesus' ministry has been quite successful, but now he heads south to the centre of Israel's religious and political institutions. He must know he is heading into conflict and likely death - look what happened to John the Baptist! But Jesus chooses. What God wanted is expressed in John 3:16—"God so loved the world he gave his Son that all who believe might live.' From the time of his birth, Jesus' life, like our own, was shaped by the choices he made, and the choices of others. Jesus made the choice to be faithful to his sense of God's call and that meant taking the good news of the reign of God to Jerusalem, and facing the consequences of this choice. DISCIPLESHIP IN OUR BUSY LIVES

Today we consider some of the personal difficulties we might have to face as disciples. First, there is no part-time discipleship. Our commitment must be wholehearted and complete. We must have a willing attitude that frees us interiorly from all other concerns so that we might be able to follow Christ regardless of our state in life or our occupation. This attitude of commitment comes not merely from our own generosity of heart but from our having been transformed into Christ through faith and baptism.

We may face conflicts when our various allegiances seem to clash. We may have family responsibilities. There are children to raise, elderly parents or infirm relatives to care for. What does discipleship require of us? We all must earn a living. Are we expected to leave our employment to follow Jesus? And if so, what then will we do? All disciples must face the interior struggle caused by the conflict of legitimate responsibilities.

The freedom of which Paul speaks comes with genuine love. If, out of love we can negotiate successfully these conflicts caused by competing responsibilities, without compromising our total commitment to Christ, we will find a new kind freedom. This is the freedom that enables us to be faithful to both sets of responsibilities according to the proper priority. We will see that commitment to Christ is primary and the circumstances of our lives with the accompanying responsibilities set the parameters within which we live out our commitment. It is not in opposition with these responsibilities or despite them, but by means of or through them that we live out our discipleship. Conference of Priests

From 13—17 June, 152 Melbourne priests gathered for a conference called by Archbishop Peter. It was great to meet together for the first time for several years due to Covid 19. Among those present were those who have served in our Parish as priests or seminarians from 1994: Fr Greg Bourke, Bishop Martin Ashe, Fr Philip Le, Fr Linh Tran, Fr Binh Le, Fr Linh Pham and me.

The theme of the conference was our mission - “I will make you fish for people”, Jesus said (Mark 1:17) and ‘Go make disciples of all nations’ (Matthew 28:18). The main presenters included Deacon Pellineen of Brisbane, Archbishop Gregory Rys of Poland, (on line) Fr Richard Rosse (Caroline Springs) and Fr Tony Kerin (Box Hill) Suzette Diaz (Melbourne) and Jacqui Giuliano (Melbourne). Archbishop Peter caught Covid and withdrew after one day.

The topics included synodality, changes in the ways of mission, building teams, being a welcoming parish, new diocesan internet service, managing stress, forming parish groups eg. Playgroups, Bible study, Alpha and Divine Renovations.
