SCRIPTURE COMMENTARY

The Israelites are guilty of having violated the first two commandments. They have made themselves a molten calf. God seems to disown them. Moses will not allow this to take place. He pleads for the preservation of the people of whom he is a member. His appeal is twofold. He first insists that the Israelites are God's very own special people. It would be a shame to destroy them after freeing them from Egypt. Moses then appeals to the promises that God made to the ancestors of the Israelites. How could God possibly renege on those promises? Moses is successful in his defence of the sinful people. God relents of the severe punishment intended.

This is one of the best known penitential psalms. In its initial plea the psalmist appeals to God's covenant dispositions of goodness and compassion. A thorough transformation is next required. The passage ends with a prayer that the psalmist might be empowered or permitted by God to sing a song of praise. Once reconciled with God, the psalmist does not presume intimacy with God, but asks permission to be counted again among those who do praise God. Having reconciled with God, the psalmist knows that all these things – the covenant relationship itself, forgiveness of sin, transformation of heart and the ability to praise God – are gifts of grace from God.

Paul expresses gratitude for God's goodness toward him. He then moves to a personal testimony that demonstrates the extent of God's goodness. He is grateful that Christ both strengthened him and found him worthy to proclaim the gospel. Paul is a perfect example of one who deserves punishment at the hands of God. However, the opposite occurred. He was treated mercifully. He further claims that just as his offence was great and his need for mercy was great, so the effects of God's grace in his life have been abundant. Paul ends his instruction with prayer of praise made up of themes that originated in his own Jewish tradition.

The opening verses of the gospel reading set the stage for Jesus' parables. The righteous religious leaders are contrasted with tax-collectors and sinners, who were social outcasts. Jesus depicts the extravagant solicitude of the shepherd and the woman in order to demonstrate the extent to which God will go to rescue even one lost individual. The third parable has a double focus. It points out the mercy that God shows repentant sinners. It also contrasts God's openness with the closed-mindedness of those who consider themselves faithful. There is no question about the depraved behaviour of the younger son or the resentment of the elder son when he sees his father's unrestrained joyous treatment of the errant one. But it is the picture of the father that is startling. His compassion becomes the metaphor for understanding God's compassion toward repent sinners.
