RADICAL DEMANDS OF GOSPEL LIVING

Jesus' words today are based on the law and the prophets (the two major sections of the Bible). His teachings were so unprecedented that some accused him of rejecting his religious tradition. The contrast he sets up is not between himself and the law, but between his interpretation and that of the scribes and Pharisees, the interpreters of the law for the people of that day. The formula he uses ('You have heard it said ... But I say to you ...') shows that he demands much more than mere external conformity. The four teachings (killing, adultery, divorce and oath-taking) he contrasts demonstrate how radical is his reinterpretation of the law. © Dianne Bergant CSA

LOOKING FOR LOOPHOLES

Jesus today fulfils the teaching of the Law of the Old Testament which was later in Jesus' time observed in a very literal way resulting in a tendency to look for loopholes wherever possible.

Jesus' reinterpretations were designed to take the law into their heart rather than looking for ways to get around it.

TRUTH TELLING

The fourth teaching today is Jesus teaching not to swear on oath. Jesus was trying to establish a new sort of society where truth-telling was very important.

We know the truthful person truths. We know this at the very private level of intimate relationships. Such relationships are easily fractured or soured by lying. At the community level a society will soon break down if the words of its members cannot be relied on.

TREATING ALL WITH RESPECT

Nelson Mandela wrote in his book "Long Walk to Freedom", that hostility towards his prison wardens would be self-defeating and that everyone, even our enemies, can change. On 11 February 1990 at his release from prison after 27 years the crowd outside and millions around the world watching on TV became anxious as the time of his release was well past. Would he not walk free? Why the delay? The reason for the long delay was because he was saying an emotional good-bye and thank you to his guards.

In his freedom speech that night, Mandela reminded the world that we can all imprison ourselves behind bars of prejudice and narrow-mindedness.

SALESIAN COLLEGE SUNBURY

Last Friday, 750 gathered at a reception centre at Essendon Fields to celebrate the Graduation of Year 12 of 2022. This year, there are 313 students in Year 7 making a total college enrolment of 1560 students and a staff of 250. Planning for a second campus on the property is beginning to cater for the growth of Sunbury.

World-Wide Persecution of Christians

Last month, Pope Francis said one in every seven Christians in the world experiences persecution. Addressing the Vatican diplomatic Corps, he, now aged 86 years also voiced concern about the 'weakening of democracy' in many parts of the world, including Brazil and across the Americas, where he said political polarization was fueling social conflicts.

Cardinal Pell Remembered with Gratitude

On 14 January, at his Funeral Mass in Rome, "Pope Francis remembered with heartfelt gratitude his consistent and committed witness, his dedication to the Gospel and to the Church, and especially his diligent collaboration with the Holy See in its recent economic reform, for which he laid the foundations with determination and wisdom."

Ecumenical Visit Brings Peace

From 3rd to 5th February, Pope Francis, Archbishop Justin Welby of Canterbury and Dr Ian Greenshields, Moderator of the Church of Scotland visited together South Sudan, the youngest nation of the world. A local priest said the Pope ignited a sense of peace, allowing people to walk even at night relaxed and in security.

So what happened at the Parish Assembly?

Guest speaker, Fr Professor Frank Moloney, held the 60 participants spellbound with his insights into the Australian Plenary Council decrees and into the significance of Pope Francis who has given Catholic Christians the motivation to pay as much attention to the Word of God as we do to our traditional liturgies; to become a more joyful and merciful people, more Christ-like in our relationships; to dream of a better future for our community and our planet, walking together listening to and sharing each another's joys and sorrows.

Any nervousness about voicing our thoughts on the eight identified themes and writing them on tens of Post-It notes, evaporated as the table facilitators quickly established a respectful atmosphere for each break-out group. Michael McConville and his youthful apprentice, Natasha John, did an amazing job facilitating the day overall. Michael's great skills and good humour were much appreciated. The small-group discussion approach was hugely successful in allowing parishioners to drill down into what the themes and decrees will actually mean for our parish in 2023. For three hours there was such a joyful buzz in the hall which can

be attributed not only to the wonderful finger food lunch (Thank you Mary, Nilda, Sr Jose and Juan Carlos) but also to the display of so many parish group reports as well as to the time and energy put into planning by the Parish Pastoral Coordinating Team (PPCT). Thanks also to the many parishioners who while not present prayed for the success of the assembly. All these efforts paid off. By 3 o'clock on the day we were revitalised. We felt proud to be Catholic.
