HOLY WEEK AND EASTER: A TIME OF WITNESS, INVITATION, WELCOME

Holy Week and Easter are near. What do they mean to us? Will we gather in sincerity and numbers at the liturgies which celebrate the foundation of our faith, without which, we would have no faith? As St Paul to the Corinthians wrote bluntly, "If Christ has not been raised, then your faith has nothing to it."

Whatever personally draws us to the Holy Week and Easter Liturgies, will our presence together say anything to the Sunbury community in which we live? Will our carefully planned Liturgies have a value to anybody except ourselves? Does that even matter?

Because the reality is that compared to those who state that they have No Religion. Catholics in Sunbury are now a minority. The statistics gathered by the Australian Catholic Bishops Conference from the last National Census in 2021 reveal and confirm what we sense.

- Catholics in Sunbury 12,812.
- Catholics 28 percent of the Sunbury population.
- Other Christians 9.126
- Non-Christians 2,331
- No Religion 18,878

If we add up the Catholics and the other Christians together, that makes 21,938, then all Christians just outnumber the No Religion group. However, if we add those who did not state what religion they were (2,592) to the No Religion group then that adds up to 21,470. This makes Christians in Sunbury according to the 2021 census, the largest group but just by a whisker. Certainly, the No Religion group is now the largest single group.

How does that make you feel or think?

It makes me think of how crucial the Holy Week and Easter Liturgies are because participating in these says something much more important than a tick on the Census form. Why? Because these Holy Days now become a time to witness, invitation and welcome. They cannot remain simply a private choice.

The fact that we gather to celebrate the passing over of the Lord from death to life and how we believe this to be the non-negotiable foundation of what it means to live life and give us purpose and hope, is bearing witness to this to the wider community. Without ourselves and the other Christians of Sunbury gathering to worship, the story of Jesus would go untold.

So here is a moment to invite and welcome others to join us, especially those who are part of the 12, 812 Catholics in Sunbury but do not gather for the Sunday Assembly each week, and not to grumble about them. Let the joy and sincerity of our prayer be our witness and our welcome.

Remember, that in gathering together we also strengthen each other, something we do not always think about. My presence at worship supports everyone – a grace we silently offer to each other.

The Parish Pastoral Co-Ordinating Team (PPCT) has recently received some questions about Parish life via the Continuous Improvement forms. The responses, prepared by Fr Denis, have been reviewed by the PPCT and as requested, printed in the Bulletin.

Why do we have a Deacon?

Deacons have been part of the life of the Church from the days of the Acts of the Apostles. However, for various reasons in the Western Catholic church of which we are part in Sunbury, Deacons disappeared from parish life. Being ordained to the Diaconate was considered simply as a stepping stone to the priesthood. Deacons were swiftly ordained priests without any time working in parish life. After the Second Vatican Council the Diaconate was restored to a distinctive and visible ministry in the church. Deacons preparing for priesthood spend much time in a parish and Permanent Deacons, of which there are slowing growing numbers in Melbourne, are appointed to work in parishes, such as Deacon Stephen has been to our parish. This is an appointment of three years.

By contrast, in the Eastern Churches the Diaconate maintained its distinctive and public profile and an Eastern parish without a Deacon is considered lacking something.

Apart from Deacon Stephen's ministry at the Sunday Eucharist, proclaiming the Gospel, distributing Communion and preaching the Homily, he also assists in celebrating Baptisms (of which in Sunbury there are many) and leading Funeral Liturgies. Sooner or later, he will also celebrate his first wedding liturgy. He also forms part of the ministry team with the Office Staff, Sr Jose and Fr Jossy.

Communion Under Both Kinds.

The Sunday gathering for liturgy was badly affected during the recent time of Covid restrictions. Do you remember? Over time all restrictions on the liturgy were removed. The one remaining restriction, Communion from the Chalice, the Archbishop has also now officially removed. COVID update issued (#62. 26 Nov 2022) the Archbishop indicated that:

"Holy Communion may be distributed to the faithful under both species".

However, there has been great hesitancy across the parishes of the Archdiocese to restore Communion under both kinds. Drinking from the Common Cup still seems a step too far and remember that Covid has not gone away. I, the celebrant of the Mass, do not drink directly from the chalice when the Deacon is present. Only he drinks from the chalice. Apart from sanitizing, that is the last cautious remnant of the Covid restrictions.

The broader question is, are we ready to restore the common cup, offering it, as we did before Covid, at least to everyone even if they do not "take and drink"? While aware of people's caution over this, I personally believe that the cup should be offered to all, each Sunday in obedience to the Lord's word, "take and drink."

A restoration of the common cup would require a strong consensus of the Sunday Assembly.
