# HOLY WEEK AND THE SACRED THREE DAYS: A FESTIVAL OF FAITH OR A TEST OF **OUR ENDURANCE?**

Soon it be Holy Week, from Palm Sunday to Easter Sunday. One of the features of this week is the length of the liturgies. I am always amused when people comment about this.

We Western Christians have little idea how long the Eastern Liturgies for Holy Week are. The Paschal Vigil of the Eastern Churches goes for many hours. From the Russian community on Holy Saturday night I have rarely returned home before 3.00am in the morning. The Liturgies are long and complex. The parish pours every single resource they possess into them, especially the singing. All for one night. People joke, "Christ is Risen. The priest is dead!"

Our own Western Catholic tradition confirms how important Easter is, "The Easter Triduum of the passion and resurrection of Christ is thus the culmination of the entire liturgical year. What Sunday is to the week, the solemnity of Easter is to the liturgical year." Interestingly the church does not say this about Christmas.

We in the West like our liturgies to be short and indeed our liturgies are short. So Easter comes as a shock when the liturgies are long. People who usually attend the 45 minute Saturday Evening Vigil Mass or those who do not attend a Sunday Mass at all and find themselves at the Easter Vigil, struggle with its length. This year - thank God - the Easter Vigil will be longer because we are blessed with the baptism and welcome into the church of seven adults. Yes, bring it on I say! I can't wait.

So when you are attending the Holy Week Liturgies, my humble advice is sit back and relax, accept that the liturgy will be longer than usual. Of course with pews it's a hard to get out, go outside for a breath of fresh air, get a glass of water, relax and chat to a friend before going back into the church, as they can do in the Eastern churches. Remember many Eastern churches don't have pews, it's literally standing room only.

But also it is worth embracing **now** what we are celebrating during Holy Week and Easter so that we are prepared. This is what Pope Francis says about what is going on at the Liturgy and how we are involved.

If the resurrection were for us a concept, an idea, a thought; if the Risen One were for us the recollection of the recollection of others, however authoritative, as, for example, of the Apostles; if there were not given also to us the possibility of a true encounter with Him, that would be to declare the newness of the Word made flesh to have been all used up. Christian faith is either an encounter with Him alive, or it does not exist.

The Liturgy guarantees for us the possibility of such an encounter. For us a vague memory of the Last Supper would do no good. We need to be present at that Supper, to be able to hear his voice, to eat his Body and to drink his Blood. We need Him. In the Eucharist and in all the sacraments we are guaranteed the possibility of encountering the Lord Jesus and of having the power of his Paschal Mystery reach us. The saving power of the sacrifice of Jesus, his every word, his every gesture, glance, and feeling reaches us through the celebration of the sacraments.

I am Nicodemus, the Samaritan woman at the well, the man possessed by demons at Capernaum, the paralytic in the house of Peter, the sinful woman pardoned, the woman afflicted by haemorrhages, the daughter of Jairus, the blind man of Jericho, Zacchaeus, Lazarus, the thief and Peter both pardoned. The Lord Jesus who dies no more, who lives forever with the signs of his Passion continues to pardon us, to heal us, to save us with the power of the sacraments.
