

The Most Holy Body and Blood of Christ

Bread and Wine are the staples of the life of faith. They are also, simply, staples of life. As staples of life, they signify good living, the celebration of abundance. As staples of faith life, they signify strangely, by being sacrificed, offered to God in thanksgiving, as the crown of abundance, the celebration of God's faithfulness.

Bread means sustenance; wine means celebration, a movement beyond mere survival into the surplus of festival. Grain and grape are transformed through human activity into life-giving (bread) and life-celebrating (wine) elements. And when these staples of life are brought to God, he catches them up into an all-new level of life. Let's now call it divine life. So human life is completed by surplus, by moving beyond itself, first from survival to celebration, and then, by carrying up that movement onto the plane of the ultimate, into sharing in the divine life God made us for and calls us to.

Of course, I'm talking about what happens at the altar, the table of feasting that joins heaven and earth, unites God and humanity. Incredibly, our understanding of bread and wine goes back to the origins of faith, to the life of Abraham.

This week's first reading is the first place, in fact, that bread and wine appear in Scripture. Melchizedek, whom Abraham gives a tenth of his surplus and who brings out bread and wine, is a priest-king of Salem (the future Jerusalem), who serves "God Most High." Abraham recognises the God of this priest-king as the very God who called him out of Babylon and who made the extraordinary promise that his family line would carry forward God's own purpose to bless all nations.

It's a strange story. Who is this priest-king? Why does Abraham give him a tithe? What's up with the bread and wine? Melchizedek sticks out like a sore thumb. But he is never heard of again in the story. He is, however, linked to David in Psalm 110, fittingly used as the Responsorial Psalm today. And the letter to the Hebrews in the New Testament has an entire chapter linking Melchizedek to Christ.

Given the prominent place of bread and wine in the farming and liturgical life of ancient Israel, it seems like this episode with Abraham (like so much in his story) is meant to be a beginning for all that is to unfold in his descendants' story. The bread and wine of Melchizedek are only fully understood at the altar of Jesus Christ, where that promise to Abraham, carried forward through the old sacrificial system, is realised in all its fullness for us today.

THE BODY OF THE LORD - CORPUS CHRISTI - THIS SUNDAY JUNE 21st-22ND

This weekend Church celebrates the feast of Corpus Christi. It a well known and loved festival of the church giving us an opportunity to stop and reflect more deeply upon the gift of the Eucharist.

The Church has faithfully followed the command of Jesus through the two thousand years that separate us from this Last Supper of Jesus with his apostles to our gathering today, as friends of Jesus who will do as he told us – in memory of him. The first Pope St. Leo wrote, "what was visible in our Savior has passed over into his mysteries" In other words, everything that Christ did to reconcile us to God — his suffering, death, resurrection, and ascension — has passed over to the sacraments. In the Eucharist is Jesus' power and presence. Through the working of the Holy Spirit, his suffering, death and resurrection affect, bless and transform our lives today. Our own life becomes life-enhancing and lifegiving for the society and the communities in which we are called to live out our baptismal vocation.

To mark this festival before the 5.30pm Vigil Mass and between the 8.30am and 10.30am Masses there will be the Exposition of t he Blessed Sacrament - a time of silent prayer and simply being in the presence of the Lord to nourish us and the bonds we share as the Body of Christ, the church.

Greetings, fellow parishioners.

As many of you know, a small group of people have been running bingo on behalf of the parish for more than 30 years. From humble beginnings at OLMC school, 'Major Bingo' has grown into the premier bingo event in Sunbury, averaging 110 to 120 players each Thursday evening.

In 2020, we made a calculated decision to change venues from the Social Club at Sunbury Football Club to Club Sunbury at Sunbury Bowling Club. This move has enabled the bingo group to provide much greater financial support to the parish; it is fair to say that the income from bingo has sustained the parish financially over the past few years. And this has been achieved quietly and seamlessly by just 6 people.

However, we now find ourselves needing assistance from the parish. Recently, due to changed circumstances, one of our number has ceased his assistance at bingo and that reduces us to 5 persons. While we can continue with just 5 helpers, that does not take into account our own personal needs, such as holidays, family commitments or illness. It is difficult to run bingo with just 4 volunteers and almost impossible with only 3. And we are not getting any younger; with an average age over 70, it is time to bring in new, and hopefully, younger volunteers.

Therefore, we are looking for an additional 1 or 2 helpers to bolster our numbers. The work is not difficult and the atmosphere is very friendly. There is no requirement that you 'call the numbers' if you are apprehensive about that – there are many simple tasks which contribute to a successful evening and you will be well supported in the learning phase.

Club Sunbury is a welcoming venue and they are pleased to have bingo played there each week. Generally, the bingo group meets at about 5pm for an informal dinner, tickets are sold from 6:30 and 'eyes down' commences at 7:30. We aim to finish playing at 10:15, after which we enjoy a short 'wrap-up' of the evening's events.

So, what are the attributes for a bingo volunteer? Most importantly, we recognise that, as well as supporting the parish financially, we are providing an important social gathering for our players. For many of them, playing bingo is their main, or only, social activity and we try to provide a warm and interactive environment. We find the time to chat with players and ensure that, above all, they enjoy the evening.
